

Current status of Diabetes in Somerset

Eclipse data 30 September 2023

- Somerset Population 604,215
- > 38,304 Patients Living with Diabetes (PLWD) (6.4%)
- > 35,321 T2D (92.2%)
- > 2,983 T1D (7.8%)
- Similar number with pre-diabetes Only getting worse
- Very hard to identify exact spend on diabetes but estimated at 10% of NHS budget, with 10% of that on medication.
- ► For Somerset that represents approximate costs of £100m with £10m on meds.



Key issues for Somerset


- ▶ Projected to rise to 54,000 by 2035 Low estimate.
- ► Identifying and supporting people in Somerset with undiagnosed diabetes.
- ► There are many services and support, but signposting is not clear or easy to navigate.
- ► The percentage of Somerset CCG/ICB GPs meeting all three treatment targets in 2021/22, was below England average.
- ► In 2017/18 19/20 minor diabetic lower-limb amputation procedures higher than England average and the highest per 10,000 out of all CCGs in England.
- ► The additional risk of mortality among people with diabetes was 42.4% in the Somerset (England, 21.8%).
- ▶ Data is very poor.

Somerset Diabetes Programmes

- ► NHS Diabetes Prevention Programme (NDPP)
- Diabetes Recovery Programme
 - Risk stratification
 - Digital diabetes
- Type 2 Diabetes Path to Remission (T2DR)
- Peri-operative Service



Supporting practices to improve diabetes care following the impact of COVID on patients with diabetes.



Objectives

- Increase number of PLWD receiving all 8 care processes annually
- Increase number of PLWD attaining all 3 treatment targets
- Improve clinical outcomes for 'high-risk' patients

Eclipse data 31 March 2023 (QoF Year 2022/23)

> 52% of PLWD received all 8 care processes in last 12 months (18/77 ICBs in England)

27% of PLWD in range for all 3 treatment targets (57/77 ICBs in England)



Current Status

- Recruitment of project and nursing team
- Supporting 8 practices intensively
- Notable improvements in care process completion in all
- Treatment targets still an issue and slower to change
- Reviewed over 150 high-risk patients and developed treatment plan

Practice Assessment

- Initial assessment with practice including
 - Validation of Eclipse data with practice level data
 - Review of current practices processes/protocols
 - Identification of staffing requirements (recruitment, training)
- QI action plan developed with agreed milestones
- ► Regular review meetings at 4, 8 and 12 weeks



Support Offer

- Practice assessment with improvement plan
- Diabetes resources, training and education for staff
- DSN and Consultant led virtual clinics
- Group Consultation Training
- Pier Support
- Collaborative working (PC, PCN, ICB, DICT, SFT, PH)
- Diabetes Engagement Events for healthcare professionals



Next steps

- Continue to work with practices seeking support
- Recruitment of pharmacist to support high risk patients
- Continue group consultation training
- Continue development of education and training resources
- Increase awareness of services and referral pathways

Digital diabetes - MyWay Diabetes

- Over 11 000 patients living with diabetes (PLWD) registered (30%)
- Projected reduction in complications such as heart attacks and strokes leading to saving of over £500 000 per year

For registered PLWD in Somerset, improvements noted in:

- Blood sugar control
- Blood pressure
- ▶ Cholesterol
- Weight

Next Steps

- Continue to increase number of patients registering with MWD
- Increase number of patients starting/completing structured education
- Increase number of staff attending MWD introductory webinars








