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IPC champions education programme for Somerset care homes underway

WE ARE pleased to share that the Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) Champions Education Programme for care homes is now underway, with the first session successfully held on Thursday 24th April at Wynford House in Yeovil.

This new programme is designed to support care home staff in becoming IPC Champions - empowering them with the knowledge, skills, and confidence

to lead on infection prevention within their settings. The course runs over six months and includes six sessions, each focusing on key IPC principles and practical applications.

During the first session, attendees were introduced to the programme, met fellow participants, and received their IPC workbooks.

On completion of all six sessions, participants will receive a certificate

to acknowledge their learning and contribution to improving resident safety.

We are aiming for this to be a rolling programme, with another cohort planned to start in winter 2025. Further details will be shared in future newsletters.

Thank you to everyone involved for helping to strengthen IPC practices across our care home community.

Care homes and monitoring oral health

SMILING Matters refers to a report published by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) in the UK, which



examines the quality of oral health care provided to residents in care homes across England Smiling mat-

ters Maintaining good oral health throughout life and into older age improves general health and wellbeing, and plays an important part in helping people stay independent.

Poor oral health can adversely affect people's general health – for example, problems with eating and drinking can lead to malnutrition.

There is also considerable evidence that links poor oral health with aspiration pneumonia, particularly in residential settings.

This is because people can inhale bacteria in dental plaque. Good levels of oral care will help

to prevent various medical and dental conditions from occurring.

All residents should have an oral health assessment when they move into the care home, with the result recorded in their care plan.

The toolkit is a resource that helps care homes improve oral health and prevent infections for their residents.
