Signs and symptoms

Prodromal Phase:

Koplik Spots

Fever - Measles often begins with a high fever, which may spike up to 40°C/104°F.

Runny/Stuffy Nose

The early stages may include symptoms similar to a common cold, with a runny or congested nose.

Conjunctivitis

Red and watery eyes, often sensitive to light, can manifest as a distinctive sign during the initial stages. These are small, white spots with bluish centres that appear inside the mouth, usually on the inner lining of the cheek. They are unique to measles and may precede the rash.

Rash

After a few days, a characteristic red-brown rash typically begins on the face and then spreads down the body. The rash consists of flat, red spots that may merge as the illness progresses. fied in **Bristol.** Please remain vigilant, particularly for individuals presenting with rash illnesses following recent international travel.

Effective triage and prompt isolation are essential to prevent further spread.

The incubation period is typically 10-12 days. Infected individuals can spread the virus from approximately 4 days before to 4 days after the rash appears.

ALL staff members are urged to ensure they have received the full 2 doses of the MMR vaccine or provide proof of a positive antibody test. It is safe to receive a booster MMR dose.

Prompt reporting

ALL instances of suspected measles must be reported with urgency to the Health Protection Team (HPT) through immediate phone contact.
